Remember! Only you can increase membership. **ASK SOMEONE**







SHARE THE ORDER

ARTHRITIS

Last month I began my term as Assembly Arthritis Chairman by telling you about the wonderful magazine printed by the Arthritis Foundation and urging you to subscribe. I hope you have done so and are enjoying the beautiful bimonthly publication. I also stated I would discuss five habits that are suggested to people who have the disease to help them live more comfortable.

The first is: GET A GOOD DIAGNOSES. If you can find a rheumatologist in your area--see him. The Arthritis Foundation at 1-800-444-1993 can help you find one. It may require several weeks waiting for the appointment, but it is still the best solution. If you like him, okay. If you don't, find another. If your general practitioner is the only choice, see him and be sure you get a proper examination and lab tests. As is often stated there are 100 kinds of arthritis and it is important to know what kind.

A grocery checker once confided to me, "I have arthritis." Noting that she was in her middle twenties and appeared quite active, I replied, "You do? What Kind?" Expecting to hear she had been dealing with Juvenile Arthritis, I was completely at a loss when she replied, "Shoulder. I get stiff scanning these groceries." All pain is not arthritis, but many people think they are the same.

There are inflammatory forms of arthritis such as rheumatoid (which we usually see as twisting fingers or other disfiguring effects) and osteoarthritis (which affects the joints, often the knees and hips). Not to be confused with osteoporosis, which is a completely different disease of the bone, not the joint. Fibromyalgia, lupus, Sjogren's syndrome are just a few of the arthritis diseases commonly seen and this is the reason you need an exact diagnosis.

X-rays are part of the diagnosis because joint damages are different in Rheumatoid and Osteoarthritis, called RA and OA. The doctor will see erosions and osteophites (nodes or bony growths over the joint) and distinguish between the two types of arthritis. He can determine the extent of the disease and may prescribe the appropriate drug. Sometimes, doctors prescribe herbal remedies and folk-remedies, but they also will tell you to "keep moving" with appropriate exercises. And exercise is a topic for another letter.

Arthritis is chronic, it is never going to go away. It may go into remission for short periods with proper attention, so you do need a specialist who you trust and are comfortable in talking with. Careful monitoring, so your joints sustain little damage, will permit you a lifetime of function. Be good to yourself and mind your doctor.

We enjoyed refreshments and lots of visiting after the installation. Now we are on to the work of our year.



FISH FRY IS A GO!



5 THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW YOUR CELL PHONE COULD DO



- **1. Emergency** The Worldwide Emergency Number is 112. If you find yourself faced with an emergency outside your coverage area, dial 112. Your cell phone will search for any existing network and establish the emergency number for you. Interestingly, 112 can be dialed even if your keypad is locked.
- 2. Locked Your Keys in Your Car If you have a keyless entry, this may come in very handy. If you lock your keys in you your car, call someone who has another set, from your cell phone to their cell phone. Hold your phone about a foot from your car and have the other person press the unlock button while holding it near their cell phone. Your car will unlock no matter how far away you are.
- **3. Hidden Battery Power -** To activate the hidden power reserve of your cell phone press *3370#. Your phone will restart with this reserve and show a 50% increase in battery power. Don't worry, the reserve power will be replenished the next time you charge the battery.
- **4. Stolen Cell Phone** If your phone gets stolen or lost, call your service provider with the serial number of your phone. Your service provider will then be able to block your phone so the thief won't be able to use it even if they change the SIM card. This won't help you to get your phone back, but at least you won't have your minutes used up. To check your phone's serial number, key in the following *06#. A 15-digit code will appear. This number is unique to your phone so write it down and keep it in a safe place.
- 5. Free Directory Service To avoid charges for 411 calls, dial (800) FREE411, OR (800) 373-3411, you won't incur any charges

The boy's father was speechless. Then the son added. "Thanks Dad, for showing me how poor we are."




