Is Odd Fellowship Alive in Ashton?

Your first question probably is: "What is Odd Fellowship?" The Odd Fellow lodge is a fraternal brotherhood. Its objective is "to improve and elevate the character of mankind." Its motto is "Friendship, Love and Truth".

The Odd Fellows lodge was started in England in the early seventeen hundreds. It began as an opportunity for men to get together to help one another to find work, help with family problems and support each other in times of need.

Odd Fellowship was founded in the United States on April 29, 1819 and spread throughout the country. In the west, one of the first organizations and buildings in town was often the Odd Fellows lodge. At one time, in the Upper Snake River Valley, there were Odd Fellows and Rebekahs (women's branch) Lodges in Pocatello, American Falls, Blackfoot, Shelley, Idaho Falls, Roberts, Rexburg, St.. Anthony, Dubois and Ashton. At present only Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Ashton have both lodges. American Falls and Blackfoot have only a Rebekah Lodge. The Ashton lodge was instituted in April 1906 and the lodge hail was built in 1907.

From the time the Odd Fellows Lodge started in Ashton until the mid to late 1950's, many of the leading businessmen and citizens were members. By that time the government was starting to take control of a lot of things that the Odd Fellows were doing locally, i.e. education for orphans, burying the dead, caring for widows and relief for the distressed. At one time the Odd Fellow Lodge owned and operated an orphanage in Idaho Falls, and nursing homes in Nampa and Sandpoint.

Today the Odd Fellow Lodge and Rebekahs Lodge in Ashton, have about 25 members who are still doing things in the community to benefit the citizens. The Rebekahs have given a scholarship to graduating seniors for the last 50 years. The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs own the Flea Market, a second hand thrift store, which has been open for 40 years. Several non-profit organizations in the Ashton and St. Anthony area operate the Flea market at different times during the year as fund raisers for their organizations.

The Ashton Christian Fellowship Church, the Ashton Community United Methodist Women, Zion Lutheran Mary Martha League, and 3rd Ward LDS Young Women are church groups that have run the Flea Market for mission projects, youth camp funds and other needs.


Mesa Falls Marathon Committee and the Ashton American Dog Derby Committee have raised funds for those community events.

St. Anthony P.E.O., Ashton P.E.O., St. Anthony and Ashton American Legion Auxiliary, and. Parent Teacher Partners have used the Flea Market to raise money for educational projects. The Red Hat Society, Upper Valley Humane Society, North Fremont Cheerleaders, and Daughters of the Utah Pioneers have also raised funds for their varied projects at the Flea Market. At present, the Flea Market is closed for renovation. Since this is the only building in Ashton that is on the Historic Registry, many local residents feel a special interest in it's history.

The Flea Market should not look much different when it gets it's planned new window, but starting in April, it will have a clean, fresh look.

Although the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs Lodges goals have changed over the years, they still play an important role in the life of the Ashton Community.

Yes Odd Fellowship is alive in Ashton.


Preston Putnam Goes to Regional Wrestling Tournament

The Story Behind the Picture of "The Praying Hands"



Back in the fifteenth century, in a tiny village near Nuremberg, lived a family with eighteen children. Eighteen! In order merely to keep food on the table for this mob, the father and head of the household, a goldsmith by profession, worked almost eighteen hours a day at his trade and any other paying chore he could find in the neighborhood.

Despite their seemingly hopeless condition, two of Albrecht Durer the Elder's children had a dream. They both wanted to pursue their talent for art, but they knew full well that their father would never be financially able to send either of them to Nuremberg to study at the Academy.

After many long discussions at night in their crowded bed, the two boys finally worked out a pact. They would toss a coin. The loser would go down into the nearby mines and, with his earnings, support his brother while he attended the academy. Then, when that brother who won the toss completed his studies, in four years, he would support the other brother at the academy, either with sales of his artwork or, if necessary, also by laboring in the mines.

They tossed a coin on a Sunday morning after church. Albrecht Durer won the toss and went off to Nuremberg.

Albert went down into the dangerous mines and, for the next four years, financed his brother, whose work at the academy was almost an immediate sensation. Albrecht's etchings, his woodcuts, and his oils were far better than those of most of his professors, and by the time he graduated, he was beginning to earn considerable fees for his commissioned works.

When the young artist returned to his village, the Durer family held a festive dinner on their lawn to celebrate Albrecht's triumphant homecoming. After a long and memorable meal, punctuated with music and laughter, Albrecht rose from his honored position at the head of the table to drink a toast to his beloved brother for the years of sacrifice that had enabled Albrecht to fulfill his ambition. His closing words were, "And now, Albert, blessed brother of mine, now it is your turn. Now you can go to Nuremberg to pursue your dream, and I will take care of you."

All heads turned in eager expectation to the far end of the table where Albert sat, tears streaming down his pale face, shaking his lowered head from side to side while he sobbed and repeated, over and over, "No ...no ...no ...no."

Finally, Albert rose and wiped the tears from his cheeks. He glanced down the long table at the faces he loved, and then, holding his hands close to his right cheek, he said softly, "No, brother. I cannot go to Nuremberg. It is too late for me. Look ... look what four years in the mines have done to my hands! The bones in every finger have been smashed at least once, and lately I have been suffering from arthritis so badly in my right hand that I cannot even hold a glass to return your toast, much less make delicate lines on parchment or canvas with a pen or a brush. No, brother ... for me it is too late."

More than 450 years have passed. By now, Albrecht Durer's hundreds of masterful portraits, pen and silver-point sketches, watercolors, charcoals, woodcuts, and copper engravings hang in every great museum in the world, but the odds are great that you, like most people, are familiar with only one of Albrecht Durer's works. More than merely being familiar with it, you very well may have a reproduction hanging in your home or office.

One day, to pay homage to Albert for all that he had sacrificed, Albrecht Durer painstakingly drew his brother's abused hands with palms together and thin fingers stretched skyward. He called his powerful drawing simply "Hands," but the entire world almost immediately opened their hearts to his great masterpiece and renamed his tribute of love "The Praying Hands."

The next time you see a copy of that touching creation, take a second look. Let it be your reminder, if you still need one, that no one - no one - - ever makes it alone!

That Personal Touch

When a new Lodge member enters your Rebekah meeting for the first time, is she welcomed and given special attention by long-time members? Or does the new member just sit in the back of the room, unnoticaed?

First impressions are lasting and how you welcome your new members will set the tone for how those members will assiilate into your Rebekah operations. Most of our leaders can attribute their success to the fact that a seasoned member tok the time and effort to provide a personal touch to a new member and encourage participation. That personal touch includes telling the new member about Rebekahs and describing Lodge operations-not all at once, but slowly, over a period of time. That personal touch also may include calling tyhe new member to offer a ride to a meeting, a neighbor Rebekah meeting, a district meeting or even a state convention.

The more value the new member can see form being involved in Rebekahs, the more likely she is to become a Lodge leader. The same goes for your more seasoned members who have stopped attending Rebekah meetings.

A committee-either membership, telephone or a specially appointed "Lodge outreach" may start a campaign to contact these nonparticipating members, either by telephone or personally meeting with them over coffee, encouraging them to attend Rebekah meetings or offering them an opportunity to be part of Rebekah operations. Be careful that these contact do not apear to be sesperate, nor should you pressure these members into a mroe active role. Be positive and show them the tremendous value of Rebekah membership and what they might gain from becoming active participants in our meetings.




