Pioneer Lodge # 1 is the light ship of Idaho Odd Fellowship. This has been interesting as the Lodge has taken on the project of repairing the roof over the stairwell, and repairing the front porch. As most of you know this cost a lot of money so the Lodge sent out requests to our brother and sister lodges. Thanks to all of your responses, we were able to do all that had to be done for this year. With what was raised and what we could get in grants we spent \$19,062.76. The following is a brake down in what we received

This is just a start the grant writer is talking about repairing the windows, which need to be done before they fall apart, also we need to paint the front of the building and put oil on the rest of it. We are going to need to raise another \$5,000.00.

When they built their building which was finish in 1875 it cost \$2,826.95.

In the year 2014 Pioneer Lodge #1 will be celebrating 150 birthday. This is the beginning of Odd Fellowship in Idaho.

We are having a ribbon cutting ceremony September 19 to celebrate.

Some of the questions asked were quite revealing only about one in ten knew what an Odd Fellow was one person wanted to know if we had to swear an oath of allegiance when we joined.. The IOOF has a serious public relations problem some how we must get the word out as to who we are and what we stand for.





At our last meeting we had sent out letters to all members for our "Bake less Food Sale". This has resulted in a very good "fund" project.



HISTORY OF THE JACK O'LANTERN

People have been making jack o'lanterns at Halloween for centuries. The practice originated from an Irish myth about a man nicknamed "Stingy Jack." According to the story, Stingy Jack invited the Devil to have a drink with him. True to his name, Stingy Jack didn't want to pay for his drink, so he convinced the Devil to turn himself into a coin that Jack could use to buy their drinks. Once the Devil did so, Jack decided to keep the money and put it into his pocket next to a silver cross, which prevented the Devil from changing back into his original form. Jack eventually freed the Devil, under the condition that he would not bother Jack for one year and that, should Jack die, he would not claim his soul. The next year, Jack again tricked the Devil into climbing into a tree to pick a piece of fruit. While he was up in the tree, Jack carved a sign of the cross into the tree's bark so that the Devil could not come down until the Devil promised Jack not to bother him for ten more years.

Soon after, Jack died. As the legend goes, God would not allow such an unsavory figure into heaven. The Devil, upset by the trick Jack had played on him and keeping his word not to claim his soul, would not allow Jack into hell. He sent Jack off into the dark night with only a burning coal to light his way. Jack put the coal into a carved-out turnip and has been roaming the Earth ever since. The Irish began to refer to this ghostly figure as "Jack of the Lantern," and then, simply "Jack O'Lantern."



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
