However, being a natural "Mr. Fixit" guy, I especially enjoy wood working and almost always have a refinishing or wood building project in progress, so long as the temperature in the garage is cooperating.

Our youngest graduated from Boise State last spring and is currently pursuing her master's degree in hydrology. As one can imagine raising five children keep Marilyn and I busy but we have always recognized how fortunate we were and felt the need to express that in some manner. About 28 years ago we adopted a current love in our lives, that being volunteers at our local Soup Kitchen. We have been the co-directors for the Kitchen for most of that time and also serve on the Board of Directors. The Kitchen started very small in 1985 and served only ten to twenty guests on weekends. During those early years the Kitchen attendance grew steadily and quite rapidly to where it currently serves an average of about 135 people a day, seven days a week. There are about 800 volunteers each year that work at the kitchen. Marilyn takes care of all the volunteer scheduling, training, and public interface associated with the kitchen operations and I take care of everything associated with maintaining the inventory of food and supplies, the grounds and building maintenance, and all the general handyman stuff. Together we volunteer an average about 20 hours a week but we have always felt we have received much more from the work than we have given.

My history with the Odd Fellows has only been 30+ years and it was spent entirely with the Bingham Lodge until it closed last spring. I was introduced to the Odd Fellows by my father-in-law and immediately felt very much at home in the organization. Mostly due to the care and attention I was paid by the members in those early years. Maybe there is a lesson there for all of us. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in the Order because Bingham Lodge and Home Encampment were always doing things in the Lodge and in the community. Having lost my home Lodge now, I only hope is that I will not lose, in the coming years, the enthusiasm I have always felt for Odd Fellowship. I also hope I can bring my love of the Order to bear during the coming year and inspire all of the membership to either get involved with their Lodge and/ or community or to expand the involvement they already have in place.
