National Day of Prayer

National Day of Prayer calls on all people of different faiths in the United States to pray for the nation and its leaders. It is held on the first Thursday of May each year. In 1775 the Continental Congress allocated a time for prayer in forming a new nation. Over the years, there have been calls for a day of prayer, including from President Abraham Lincoln in 1863. On April 17, 1952, President Harry Truman signed a bill proclaiming the National Day of Prayer into law in the United States. President Reagan amended the law in 1988, designating the first Thursday of May each year as the National Day of Prayer.

The National Prayer Committee was formed in the United States in 1972. It went on to create the National Day of Prayer Task Force, with the intended purpose of coordinating events for the National Day of Prayer. According to the Legal Information Institute, the President shall issue each year a proclamation designating the first Thursday in May as a National Day of Prayer on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer and meditation at churches, in groups, and as individuals.

We will be serving Hot Dogs that day. Any Body wanting to bring a side dish for the open house will be welcomed. Looking for a Good Turn out Again.



Our sister, Lucille B. Harten, age 97, of Chubbuck, Idaho, passed away peacefully while in the company of family members on Sunday, March 22, 2015. She had been a member of Ivy Rebekah Lodge #23 since October, 1953.

Lucille was married to Kenny Harten and after having six children, Lucille returned to school and earned her Bachelor's Degree in Anthropology and later a Masters in Paleontology. She is credited with discovering the largest ancient bison found on the North American continent, at the American Falls Reservoir. She served as Assistant Director of the ISU Museum, she kept books for her husband's aluminum company and was even a winner of the Mrs. Idaho Contest.

Lucille played the organ and piano at her church for 71 years, and she has also provided the music at many Lodge and District meetings. She also accompanied the Silver Chords for eight years.

Because of her poor health, she was not able to attend meetings as much as she would have liked, but when she did, her smile and music lighted up the hall.

The VFW conducted its first poppy distribution before Memorial Day in 1922, becoming the first veterans' organization to organize a nationwide distribution. The poppy soon was adopted as the official memorial flower of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

During the 1923 encampment the VFW decided that VFW "Buddy"® Poppies would be assembled by disabled and needy veterans who would be paid for their work to provide them with financial assistance. The next year, disabled veterans at the Buddy Poppy factory in Pittsburgh assembled VFW Buddy Poppies. The designation "Buddy Poppy" was adopted at that time.

In February 1924, the VFW registered the name Buddy Poppy with the U.S. Patent Office. A certificate was issued on May 20, 1924, granting the VFW all trademark rights in the name of Buddy under the classification of artificial flowers. The VFW has made that trademark a guarantee that all poppies bearing that name and the VFW label are genuine products of the work of disabled and needy veterans. No other organization, firm or individual can legally use the name Buddy Poppy.

Today, VFW Buddy Poppies are still assembled by disabled and needy veterans in VA Hospitals.

The VFW Buddy Poppy program provides compensation to the veterans who assemble the poppies, provides financial assistance in maintaining state and national veterans' rehabilitation and service programs and partially supports the VFW National Home For Children.
