Patriarchs and Matriarchs

We live in an unprecedented time. Covid is again on the rise, and hospitals are enacting emergency procedures. The economy is experiencing a high rate of inflation which is affecting our groceries, fuel, and amenities. Idaho is experiencing rapid growth, and the housing market here in the valley is at an all-time high with no end in sight. With all of this comes change. Change to our state, changes to our households, and change to our lodges and encampments. Change can bring uncertainty, and it can bring fear, but it can also provide opportunities.

Heraclitus said: "the only constant in life is change," but that doesn't make it easy. It doesn't matter if you are young, or old, rich, or poor, a leader, or follower; change is hard. As leaders, the burden falls on you all to help your lodge (or any organization) cope with change. Multiple books are written on this subject, but most use the term 'Change Management.' I like this term because if something can be managed, it can be controlled; there is no reason to fear what can be controlled.

Most of us manage change as individuals, but as more people become involved it becomes very complex. In order to manage change within a group, you need two things: a common vision, direction, or action plan, and buy-in from your team. Often you will have a vision of what needs to happen, but so does everyone else in the room. This could end with everyone doing 'what is best for the organization', but with no common vision, members acting independently create chaos which leads to uncertainty, and again fear.

Communication is key to resolving these differences. Ideas need to be vetted out with full transparency and a detailed path needs to be chosen with everyone committed to that vision. Commitment is to understand, accept, and align with the plan. This is key to managing change, without this fundamental principle, organizations fracture into 'tribes' who work against each other causing strife and mistrust leading to an unhealthy and unproductive environment.

Our meetings follow Roberts Rules of Order, all ideas are heard, and everyone participates. The result is a path chosen by the majority of the group. But what of those who do not side with the majority?






I apologize for things not getting out on time and for the mistakes made on your Annual Reports, hopefully we have those all straightened out.

More News from Portneuf #20



Jo Piller, 89 April 6, 1932 - October 15, 2021

On April 6, 1932, the world was graced with Jo Piller. Her full name was Betty Jo, but she didn't use her first name.

She was born to Jack and Betty McRoberts and grew up in Casper, Wyoming. When she was in high school, the family moved to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho where she met and later married Roger Lillibridge on September 12, 1949. They had a son, R. Jay, and a daughter, Sheridan Anne. Jo worked as a nurse in Moscow, Idaho later working at Providence Hospital in Wallace. She subsequently went to college, earning her teaching degree at LCSC in Lewiston. While in college, she met Rod Piller. They fell in love and married on May 26, 1967. In 1970, they found their home in Kamiah where she taught fifth grade until her retirement. Jo was a Red Hatter, rarely missed her weekly Bridge day, bowled on a team, and was an accomplished seamstress sewing for friends and family.

Music was an important part of her life. She played the organ for St. Catherine's Catholic Church for 42 years. For many years, Jo was the pianist for the Kamiah and, later, Kooskia Rebekah Lodges, played piano for her District meetings, played when visiting Lodges, and for years played for the annual Idaho Rebekah Assembly during the Idaho Grand Sessions. She lived her life following the Rebekah Creed of Friendship, Love, and Truth. Jo led a full and happy life and was loved by many. She will always shine in our hearts.







Lucille Ellen Franklin March 5, 1931 – November 3, 2021

Lucille Ellen Franklin, 90, of Cambridge, ID passed away Wednesday, November 3, 2021 at a Weiser, ID hospital. She was born March 5, 1931 on a ranch near Castle Rock, CO, the second daughter of P.H. "Dick" Clarke and Esther Benson Clarke. She joined a sister Lillian at home. Later a brother Ronald and another sister Dixie completed the family.

The Clarke family moved to Boise, ID where Lucille and Lillian attended the old Garfield Elementary School. They moved to Council, ID when Dick and Esther purchased a ranch north of town. Lucille earned spending money baby sitting and working in town at the Golden Rule store. She spent the money on a camera and film and took many of the family's photos.

Lucille married John "Johnnie" Franklin of Mesa, ID on May 14, 1949 at Cambridge, ID. They lived at the Mesa Orchards where their first son John Michael was born. When the Mesa Orchard Company went bankrupt, they moved to Council, ID where their second son Gary was born.

The Franklins moved to Cambridge in 1958, where Johnnie and Lucille opened their first store in what is now the Cambridge Museum. They did electric and plumbing work, sold appliances, TVs, radios, furniture, and electric and plumbing supplies.

In 1973 Johnnie, Lucille and son Gary purchased The Wilson Building and opened Franklin Electric and Plumbing. Lucille worked at the store for 40 years until a stroke forced her into retirement.

Johnnie was a member of the Odd Fellows Lodge and Lucille was a member of the Rebekah Lodge. They enjoyed attending lodge functions together. Lucille was a Rebekah for over 65 years. Johnnie and Lucille spent time together camping, riding trail bikes, driving forest roads and snowmobiling. Lucille was a den mother when her sons were in the Cub Scouts. She enjoyed reading and doing genealogy.

Lucille is buried next to her husband Johnnie and son Mike at the Council IOOF Cemetery.
